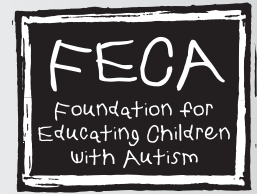

## Festive Fall Dinner Honors Three Champions of FECA's Mission

Martinis and Motown were not the only things on the agenda at FECA's annual fall dinner held October 18th at the Westchester Marriott. Three stalwart champions of FECA's mission to promote and support the best educational services for children with autism were also honored.

Two area legislators, Assemblyman Adam Bradley and Assemblyman Gregory Ball, were honored for their leadership in Albany and in their local communities to promote greater access to services and to raise greater awareness as to the need for opportunities for adults with autism.

Following over two decades as a committed advocate for families and children, Adam T. Bradley was elected in 2002 as representative of the 89th District, encompassing much of White Plains and Northern Westchester. Bradley's commitment has resulted in significant contributions to the music program for students of DMLC, the substantial upgrading of the computer curriculum and support for the ever-growing vocational program. He has also provided his wisdom to a regional effort that supports potential legislative initiatives in Albany on issues ranging

from health insurance, to crisis management for families, and filling the current vacuum of services for adults with autism.

Assemblyman Gregory R. Ball has joined Assemblyman Bradley on this regional initiative and has earned a reputation as a strong voice on a number of issues affecting New Yorkers with autism and their families. Ball represents the 99th Assembly District, which includes sections of Dutchess, Putnam and Westchester counties. Assemblyman Ball has hosted several forums on autism, bringing together families, professionals and governmental representatives to identify areas of concern and need. His

newspaper and television interviews have stressed the lack of quality services for adults and children in New York State. Assemblyman Ball recently honored FECA and DMLC with a proclamation at the Autism Awareness event held annually in April at the school.

Founding Board Member Melanie Schaffran paid tribute to her fellow colleague and founding member, Terry Pirraglia, whose son Matthew was in the entering class at

## Educational Series Workshop Provides Valuable Insight

A group of parents, educators, scholars and advocates joined together on Friday January 16th for a morning workshop to explore vocational training. The workshop, entitled *Preparing Students with Autism for Post-Secondary Employment: Making a Transition from School to Work* was led by Cindy Alterson, Ph.D., BCBA, Principal and Director at Devereux Millwood Learning Center (DMLC) and Neil Boyle, M.Ed., Vocational Director at DMLC. Dr. Alterson and Mr. Boyle shared the keys to a successful vocational training program for both students and employers. DMLC has an award-winning program that has been the focus of national attention, including a CNBC television profile several years ago.

This workshop was made possible by a grant from Entergy. Additional support was provided by the Thomas and Agnes Carvel Foundation.

Heidi Lee, whose son, Alex, attends DMLC, was at the workshop. According to Heidi, "The workshop helped get parents thinking about their child's transition timeline early on (and getting it in the IEP), and also starting to think about ways to help them be as independent as possible in the home." Some of the helpful hints suggested by Neil Boyle were to find a job that follows the child's own interests. One example is a student at DMLC who loves animals is now working at the SPCA.

Dr. Alterson pointed out, much to many parents' relief, that employers are more concerned with the way a student fits into the workplace than their measur-

able job performance. According to Dr. Alterson, employers value a worker who will say hello to their supervisor and keep the bathroom clean and are less concerned with the number of papers that are shredded in a given time frame. "Preparing the students to master a task is important but our experience has taught us that employers are most concerned about social skills and attendance."

Mr. Boyle provided many resources for parents, educators and advocates during the workshop and stressed that attendance and communication are key to a successful placement. "Our work site partners rely on our students – many parents bring their children to their jobs when school is closed. Several of our volunteer partnerships have turned into paid

employment opportunities for students." The key to any good vocational training program is communication. "Letting an employer know about the student and addressing any problems that come up very quickly is vital," states Mr. Boyle. Heidi Lee felt this was an important piece of information. "Neil's suggestions of having a quiet exit route preplanned if the student needs a break and getting a bag of chips at the vending machine after the work is done were so helpful," states Heidi. "I think that parents of students from other schools came away with many practical ideas of how to approach their school districts to get a good transitional plan in place."

DMLC 13 years ago and will graduate this year. Terry has repeatedly challenged the obstacles and prejudices that children with autism have encountered. "No" was simply not an option when Terry, along with the rest of the founding board, was told that the creation of a school was not possible. Terry played a pivotal role during the early days when the school was just a dream, through its inception and early struggles to find its footing, and with its current growth to the 48-member student body it educates daily.

The struggle is far from over, however, as FECA embraces the harsh reality that our students might graduate to a world that still makes opportunity and growth difficult, if not impossible. Once again, Terry will not accept failure. Progress on the post-21 adult program that will provide supported employment and community integration opportunities for our graduates, and others in the surrounding communities, is expected to be in place, thanks largely to her stalwart leadership.

Though the honorary achievement awards reflected the serious challenges that FECA has met, this was also an opportunity for celebration and the over 300 friends, family, colleagues and supporters all took to the dance floor as The Party Dolls presented a challenge of their own: how to keep up with their spirited Motown beat! Those who had to take a breath made their way to the colorful martini bars and the spectacular silent auction organized by FECA Board Members Liz Finder, Peggy Wedin and Melanie Schaffran.

A fantastic array of silent auction items included theater tickets, fine wines, gift baskets, jewelry, designer handbags and computer programs. The sports and entertainment section, organized by FECA Board Member Phil Orlando, featured hard-to-get football tickets, autographed photos of Michael Phelps and Eli Manning; and even special items like collages of Miley Cyrus and High School Musical for the younger folks.

FECA wishes the very best to DMLC Alumni Sidney Jardine, Douglas Campbell and Alec Kaplan on their next big adventure!

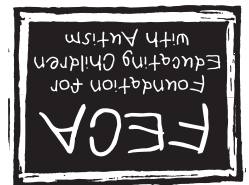
