DMLC Students Given Volunteer Spirit Award

Students from DMLC were celebrated at the annual Volunteer Spirit Awards Celebration sponsored by the Volunteer Center of the United Way of Westchester, April 27 at the Doral Arrowwood in Rye Brook. The award was in recognition of their tremendous contribution to several United Way agencies.

At the American Red Cross offices, seven students conduct office work and collate. copy and prepare mailings for blood drives. They have assembled over 1,000 comfort kits used throughout the area for use in emergency situations. At My Second Home, four students interact with a group of seniors, play games, sing songs and form relationships, referring to their senior friends as "Grandma" and "Grandpa". Five students volunteer at the Bethel Nursing Home, becoming part of their workforce, volunteering in the departments of admissions, human resources, finance, physical therapy, and for the Director of Volunteers. Over the

years, DMLC students have volunteered at the Food Bank for Westchester by packing bags that help feed those less fortunate. Future service commitments include the SPCA, Muscular Dystrophy and Juvenile Diabetes Associations.

Pratik Ravichandran, Matt Pirraglia, Mark Brailey, Doug Campbell, Andrew Finder, Danny Shire and Brett Schaffran were present to receive the award as the New York Life Youth Group honorees. Jason Tabbert, Christine DiChiara, Alec Kaplan, Alex Lee, Dashiell Saines, Kelly Wedin and David Bigelow were also part of the DMLC team nominated for the award.

Alan Kalter of the David Letterman Show was the master of ceremonies for the event in which a number of area volunteers received awards including Marty Lyons, former outstanding defensive lineman and Super Bowl champion with the New York Jets.

FECA Honors Siblings, Teachers at Autism Awareness Day 2007

The unique and heartfelt experiences of brothers and sisters and the presence of a newly elected U.S. Congressman put autism and its impact and importance in high relief as family, friends, staff and supporters gathered on April 9th to observe Autism Awareness Day at the Devereux Millwood Learning Center.

Organizers of the event felt that the voices of siblings of individuals with autism were well overdue to be heard and was an important way to raise awareness about what it is like for families living day-to-day with autism. To that end, FECA announced in February its sponsorship of an essay contest for siblings on the subject "Growing Up With Autism."

We were especially delighted that newly elected Rep. John Hall (D-19) was able to join us for the event where he heard about the impact that autism has in his district and the nation. Rep. Hall listened to the impressive essays, toured the school and met with students and staff.

FECA Honors Siblings, Teachers at Autism Aware

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Each essay winner gave his or her personal account of what it was like to live with a sibling with autism, providing often highly emotional insight into their lives. They all affirmed their commitment towards raising greater understanding and awareness of autism.

After the essays were read, Rep. Hall took the podium before a tearful audience. He admitted his limited knowledge of autism but asserted his commitment to learning about its impact in his district, his state and the country. He stated that hearing the stories from siblings made him acutely aware of autism's impact, not only on the autistic child but on the whole family, as well. He vowed to sign the "Expanding the Promise for Individuals with Autism Act" (H.R. 1881) and to be an advocate for families afflicted with this disorder.

The Fox Lane Middle School Autism Speaks Club joined our program for the second year. The club was started by a student who had a sibling with autism with the goal of raising awareness among his middle school peers. Since that time, similar high school and middle school organizations have popped up all over the country. In just one year, three siblings of DMLC students founded Autism Speaks Clubs in their schools. Lauren DiChiara founded the Autism Speaks Club in Fox Lane High School, raising over \$300 to support autism

research. Daniella Roma founded the Columbus Middle School Autism Speaks Club in Mt. Pleasant. Lauren Brailey founded the Autism Awareness Club in Scarsdale High School with 20 members and has already raised over \$5,000 through walkathons and special events.

Michelle Greene, a teacher from Eastchester School District, was presented with the first annual Autism Awareness Leadership Award. Michelle was selected to receive this honor because of the active role she has taken in advocating for inclusion of students with autism in their school and in presenting positive skills and abilities of people with autism.

The morning's program concluded with a tour of the school. Rep. Hall observed the individualized ABA curriculum of the students in several classrooms, stopped briefly to buy a bottle of water from student Patrik Ravichandran, and concluded in the school gym where students John DeCaprio, Andrew Finder and Nick Petillo gave the Congressman a few pointers on his jump shot.

In addition to the impressive activities held at DMLC for Autism Awareness Day, Cindy Alterson, Director or DMLC, and Neil Boyle, Vocational Director of DMLC, joined a host of students, family and friends at the annual Autism Walk sponsored by Autism Speaks at Manhattanville College on June 10, 2007.

Words of Wisdom From Our Winning Essays

"(Christine)...makes this incredibly annoying sound that basically gives my friends a first impression that she is a 'retard'. I hate that word. Kids in my school use the label 'retard' to describe any kid who acts completely different than them. I have come to realize they use that word because they don't understand...This is how the learning and understanding and acceptance begin. It takes small steps and education to tear down labels. People give more love when they understand. In many ways I am so lucky to have Christine in my family. She has taught so much about tolerance and compassion. Without her I'd be just another kid in the hallway saying 'retard' under my breath."

"I love my brother very much and he loves me too. Whenever I ask him to play with me, he will always say 'yes.' I don't think that Matthew would even dare himself to say 'no'. Your brother is so nice'."

Senate Subcommittee Approves Funding For Autism

The Senate Labor, Health and Human Services and Education Appropriations Subcommittee moved to provide \$53.3 million in funding for autism detection, education, awareness and intervention activities under the authority of the Combating Autism Act approved by Congress last year. The bill goes to the full Senate Appropriations Committee where it is expected to pass, where it will then face reconciliation with the parallel appropriation in the U.S. House.

FECA Partners with the MBIA Foundation, the Westchester Community Foundation and Futures and Options for Kids

The growth of the award win-Vocational ning Training Education Program has created additional needs for funding and FECA has looked to grant partners to fulfill these needs. In the past few months, we gratefully began a relationship with two new investors, the Westchester Community Foundation and the MBIA Foundation. The MBIA Foundation was introduced to FECA through vocational prostudent Matthew Pirraglia's older brother, Joseph, an MBIA employee.

"We appreciate that Joseph sought out this opportunity for FECA with his MBIA supervisor, Joanne Taylor, and we are grateful that MBIA was willing to support the DMLC students who live in the same neighborhoods where its employees live and work," stated FECA president Jay Wedin. MBIA's grant of \$10,000 will be used to help underwrite the transportation and occupancy costs associated with training our students at school and transporting them to their workplace training sites.

A second new investor, the Westchester Community Foundation, recently expanded their guidelines to include educational programs to meet the needs of students with autism. "We are delighted that the Westchester Community Foundation committee granted our request to build our voca-

tional training education program through the development of a full time position dedicated to this program," states Cindy Alterson, DMLC's director. "Their support in the amount of \$15,000 will enable us to dedicate vital staff resources to the expansion of this program."

FECA also was recently presented with a \$5,000 check from New York Board of Trade (NYBOT)/Futures and Options for Kids, a Foundation who has supported FECA for more than ten years. This grant will help underwrite behavioral specialists who accompany students to vocational program worksites. "NYBOT/Futures and Options for Kids is a great friend to FECA and the kids at DMLC," noted Dave Kimmel, one of FECA's founding family members. "We are lucky to receive
