FECA Spring Gala - The Yale Club - April 5, 2016

The Foundation for Empowering Citizens with Autism (FECA) held its 21st Annual Spring Gala on Tuesday evening, April 5th, welcoming more than 250 guests to New York City's Yale Club for the first time. The event raised more than \$200,000 to help FECA continue its mission of ensuring that individuals with autism-spectrum disorders lead meaningful and productive lives.

The benefit was chaired by 1 o n g - t i m e Board members Elise & Phil Orlando and Melanie & Drew Schaffran, bringing together supporters to celebrate both the achievements

of our young people and FECA's broader new mission to create employment opportunities for adults with autism.

Gina DeCaprio once again chaired an incredible silent auction full of exciting items, such as theater tickets, golf outings, autographed sports memorabilia, tickets to upcoming baseball, football and basketball games, fine wines, and jewelry and designer handbags. The silent auction contributed significantly to the financial success of the annual event, as most of the items are donated and secured by members of the Benefit Committee and the Board of Directors. A few select items were hotly pursued, as guests were in a feeding frenzy to go home with their coveted prize.

FECA's always-terrific raffle drawing concluded the evening in which lucky guests Tracey & Tom Hynes won the top prize, a vacation to Cancun, Mexico.

The highlight of the evening was FECA's presentation of the 2016 Community Partner Award to its honoree, *MBIA Foundation*, which has been a steadfast supporter of FECA since 2007. The Foundation has helped to support the Devereux school's vocational training program, the Devereux Adult Day Hab/supported employment program and the ONEE program. MBIA was first introduced to FECA many years ago by

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Opportunity Network for Employers and Employees (ONEE) Program: Three Years and Counting

FECA's ONEE program continued to make progress this year, adding several more volunteer sites to the Devereux Adult Program roster and beginning the process of establishing a network of "after day hab" opportunities.

Under the direction of Community Outreach Coordinator Lisa Keogh, DAP participants now also contribute their time and efforts to the Putnam Valley Grange as well as Croton Auto Park, Reform Temple of Putnam Valley and Cortlandt Healthcare in Cortlandt Manor. The Westchester Medical Center, one of the first ONEE site partners, continues to provide a wide range of opportunities.

"The ONEE program is such an asset and such a joy to Westchester Medical Center," states Patricia Boyce, Director of the Caregiver Center. "They are truly angels that bring sunshine to all of us here." The Medical Center has recently begun a project in partnership with Food Bank of Westchester to provide discharge food to patients that are unable to shop for their first meals upon leaving the hospital. "The young men from Devereux helped put together our first packages of dinner and breakfast in the pilot program. Their efforts will enable us to expand this outreach to every floor in the hospital." Extraordinary Ventures New York is well into its second year of operation and continues thrive under the astute leadership of a new director, Liz Oliveto. EVNY was incorporated in 2015 with seed money from FECA with the mission to create small busi-

nesses that match the inherent and eminently trainable talents and interests of individuals with autism.

Liz brings not only extraordinary enthusiasm and talent to the enterprise, but years of experience working with children and adults with autism; first as a teacher at the Devereux Millwood Learning Center and most recently as a job coach for participants in the Devereux Adult Program. Liz first volunteered last fall at our initial sales events which led to her assuming the sales development position providing onsite training of our salesmen. The decision to promote EVNY candles through local craft and gift fairs has not only extended the repertoire of job opportunities from production through to sales, but has reaffirmed the importance of community integration as essential to the mission of both EVNY and FECA as a principal funder of the program.

The candles, which are still being made in the Schaffran basement laboratory, are designed for gift giving throughout the seasons, originating with fall and winter holiday scents and packaging last year. Brett and Max continue to head up the production team. Behind the scenes, Alex assembles all of the literature and bags for each sale. Brian, Matt, Avery and John sell the candles, attired in the signature blue EVNY polo shirts, at local craft fairs and farmer's markets. The summer season offered a wide range of opportunities to present the festively wrapped and sunflower

adorned candles throughout Westchester county. The EVNY team sold candles at several events at the John Jay Homestead, the Strawberry Festival in Chappaqua, the Farmer's Market in Peekskill and the ever popular Yorktown Grange Fair. Seven more sales are booked at local craft fairs through the end of the year.

EVNY candles served the dual purpose of party favor and table designation for attendees at a local wedding and will be offered at several similar affairs in the near future. They are also being offered online on the enormously popular Special Mom's Network website as one of their featured products. The packaging allows for an unlimited range of specialized color coordination and personalized labeling.

A second EVNY business has been launched which caters to the office essential needs of local communities. Employees are being trained to compile mailings, offer photocopying and scanning assistance and in a special arrangement with several local libraries, regularly recycle and shred printed materials.

EVNY is in the process of obtaining office space which will enable both these businesses to continue to grow and promote the exploration of future ventures all to provide employment to an expanded workforce.

DMLC Moves to New Home in Mt. Kisco

After two decades at it's original home in Millwood, the Devereux Millwood Learning Center (DMLC) moved to a beautiful, new, substantially larger, facility in Mt. Kisco, New York. The move came with a new name, Devereux New York Cares (DNYC). The creation of the school was FECA's primary mission over 20 years ago, and a close and productive partnership with Devereux enabled DMLC to grow and thrive. FECA provided funding for the security/observation system for the new site which enables staff to

not only monitor safety, but also provides parents/caregivers the ability to observe without interference in the daily routine of the classroom. DNYC continues with an

ABA model providing 48 students from the metropolitan New York area with a state of the art education for students ages 5 through 21. Congratulations to our longtime partner!

FECA also had the opportunity to showcase its newest business venture, *Extraordinary Ventures New York* (EVNY). FECA provided the seed money for EVNY, which is a

non-profit company that intends to support three business: EV Gifts, Office Essentials and Laundry Services. These

businesses provide a place of employment for our adults with autism, with each person contributing to the best of their ability.

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Candle sales is the first EVNY business that's up and running. The candles, which were available for sale at the FECA event, are made and packaged by young adults with autism. Staffed by EVNY's Director, Liz Oliveto, and one of our voung salesman. Brian, the candles were prominently displayed at the event. In addition to selling more than 150

candles, Brian engaged several guests, encouraging them to learn about the candles and to make a purchase.

FECA Supports Cardinal McCloskey's Day Habilitation

FECA's mission of supporting programs that enhance the lives of individuals with autism spectrum disorders continues to thrive with our partner of the past five years, Cardinal McCloskey Community Services (CMCS, www.cmcs.org).

In 2011 CMCS established its first ABA based, IRA residence in Ossining, New York for young adults with autism. FECA provided the grant money needed to purchase an ABA curriculum from the New England Center for Children (NECC). NECC has a nationally recognized program for people with autism located in Southborough, Massachusetts. This curriculum contained best practices for individuals with autism in both day programming and residential life and continues to provide CMCS with the essential guidance needed to help serve the autism population.

Building on this foundation, FECA next funded a scholarship for Elizabeth Noble to obtain her Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) certification. This concentrated training has enabled Beth to train and oversee other CMCS staff in ABA in her new position as Supervisor of Day Habilitation. This year, CMCS enlisted the help of FECA to fund an ABA consultation agreement with Holistic Learning Center located in White Plains, New York. Susan Varsames, director of HLC and member of the FECA Board of Advisors, will serve as an on-going consultant providing hands on training and supervision to the CMCS Day Habilitation staff at their program in Valhalla, New York.

in which the time they spend here can make a difference," explains Boyce.

The Community Center of Northern Westchester in Katonah will welcome participants to perform duties

at their thrift store-style clothing bank. They will also ready items in the food pantry on weekday afternoons, preparing the facility for Saturday morning visits by clients. CCNW is the first site to sign up for after day habilitation hours, a priority for the ONEE program. Most participants end their activities in day hab in the early afternoon, leaving several hours free and often idle. The FECA Board recently moved to target this time period, during which participants would be required to work out their own arrangements for transportation and job coaching, if needed.

It is an exciting time for ONEE as new opportunities continue to arise. A recent

partnership with TJX Companies' Non-Traditional Workforce Initiative Program has begun with Marshalls Shoe Shop in Ossining as the first site. ONEE program participants will work side by side with traditional store employees and management to coordinate store displays, manage inventory, assist with pricing and enhance the overall customer experience. This collaboration will enable ONEE to explore opportunities within the TJX Companies to closely align work preferences and styles with the work available at Marshalls, TJX and Home Goods stores located throughout Westchester County. Another new development in 2017 includes a listing of ONEE Program Site Partners on FECA's website complete with a description of volunteer opportunities available at partner sites.
